#### > Comment

- > Content
  - ➤ No summary of the paper!
  - > Concentration of comment on one or two core themes
  - > Analysis of strengths and weaknesses (constructive criticism)
  - > Application of the idea or theory developed by the author on a related question
- ➤ Use further academic literature for scientific writing
  - Correct citations
  - Do not engage in plagiarism
- > Length: 2,500-3,000 words
  - ➤ Without front page and indices
  - ➤ Without footnotes
  - ➤ Without declaration of originality

  - ➤ Short summary: explanation of the key issues of the article
  - ➤ What is the author's message?
  - > Comment on the author's methods
  - > Explanation of the key ideas
